



Bat Survey Declaration

To be completed by the applicant or agent and returned with the planning application.

All bat species are protected by the Wildlife and Countryside Act, 1981 (as amended), and the Conservation (Natural Habitats, &c.) Regulations, 1994. This legislation makes it illegal to intentionally or recklessly kill, injure or disturb bats, or destroy their roosts¹. It is therefore essential to establish whether the works being proposed will affect bats or their roosts. This questionnaire will enable the Council to determine whether bats are reasonably likely to be present in your property, and whether a detailed survey is required².

Does your proposed development include the modification, conversion, extension, demolition or removal of buildings and structures involving the following:

The Conservation (Natural Habitats, &c.) Regulations 1994 are currently being amended – the revised regulations are expected to be published in May 2007.

² In the event that bats are found in buildings 'outside' of the above criteria, the applicant is respectfully reminded that the legislation protecting bats and their roosts still applies.

If you answer Yes to any of the above then you must consider the impact of the proposed development upon legally protected species and supply a Bat Survey. A suitably qualified and licensed person must conduct this survey and the report submitted to the Local Planning Authority with your planning application.
